## **Storm Soldiers**

Although CVE works hard to maintain our equipment, monitor power delivery 24/7, and do all we can to keep the lights on, there are circumstances beyond our control that can interfere with power delivery. Summer storms can impact the distribution of electricity due to heavy winds, flooding, and other extreme conditions. Regardless of the reason, know that when the lights go out — even during extreme weather — our lineman are doing all they can to safely and efficiently restore power day and night.

Here is a look into what happens when the lights go out. CVE linemen swing into action in a safe and efficient manner to ensure your power is restored. How long that takes depends on several factors: the extent of the storm's destruction, the number of outages, and how long it takes for our work crews to safely access the storm-damaged areas. We are careful to follow standard restoration procedures to ensure safety and to get the job done right by:

- Assessing damage to utility equipment.
- Addressing immediate safety risks, including downed power lines.
- Ensuring that essential public health and safety facilities are operational.
- Prioritizing repairs that will restore power to the greatest number of members first.
- Repairing transmission lines that carry power to large areas.
- Assessing and repairing (in this order) substations, distribution lines, and service lines to properties.

CVE would like to thank members for their patience during power outages. Additionally we would like to thank the men who put their lives on the line every day to keep the lights on. Lastly we would like to recognize our contractors A.R.C. and Deans Electric for often helping us to restore power efficiently when a big storm strikes.
